SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS GUN BAN FOR INDIVIDUALS UNDER PROTECTION ORDERS FOLLOWING BUMP STOCK BAN VETO

In 2017, the Trump Administration banned bump stocks following the mass shooting at the Route 91 Harvest music festival in Las Vegas, where bump stocks were used to kill 58 people and injure hundreds more. Bump stocks allow semi-automatic rifles to fire rapidly, simulating fully automatic fire. However, in June, the Supreme Court reversed this decision. The Court stated that bump stocks do not convert guns into machine guns, which are highly regulated, and therefore do not require a ban.

In a somewhat surprising move the following week, the Supreme Court upheld a crucial law in the U.S. v. Rahimi case, affirming restrictions on individuals subject to restraining orders from possessing firearms. This decision is particularly significant and reassuring, as the presence of guns significantly increases safety risks for survivors of domestic violence. By maintaining these restrictions, the Court reinforces protections aimed at safeguarding vulnerable individuals from potential harm and ensuring safer environments for domestic violence survivors across the country.

UNLOCKING RELIEF: HELP FOR VICTIMS OF COERCED DEBT

Economic abuse in the form of 'coerced debt' significantly impacts lives by affecting credit history and the ability to achieve or maintain independence and autonomy. Recognizing this, the California Legislature and Governor Newsom passed SB 975, which became law in 2023.

If you are a victim of domestic violence, elder abuse, dependent adult abuse, or a foster youth who has also suffered from coerced debt, you may qualify for relief from collection activities for 'coerced debts' incurred on or after July 1, 2023, under SB 975. The law defines coerced debt as 'a particular debt...incurred as a result of duress, intimidation, threat of force, force, fraud, or undue influence.'

To be eligible to apply for U.S. Citizenship, you must:

- Be at least 18 years old by the date you file be a lawful permanent resident for at least 5 years Have been present in the U.S. for 2 % of the past 5 years and have not been outside the U.S. for 1 year or more within the last 5 years Be able to speak, read, and write ordinary English and pass a U.S. civics test Be a person of "good moral charactery."

Cultivating Culture: Emily Burgueno's Dedication to the Kumeyaay Nation's Rematriation

Emily Burgueno is an enrolled citizen of the lipay Nation of Santa Ysabel, which is one of twelve Kumeyaay Bands in Southern California (and 6 Kumiai Villages located in Baja CA Mexico as the U.S. border crossed Kumeyaay homelands). Ms. Burgueno's commitment as Head Seed Keeper with Maat Hetemii (local community garden on SY Rez) has been such full circle work. Since January 2020, she has developed a space to prioritize improving community well-being with foundational guidance from her matriarchs and mentors. Ms. Burgueno is rooted in Kumeyaay life ways and tries to implement these teachings in her daily work for the community and land. One of her many goals is to uplift rematriation throughout the Kumeyaay Nation. "Rematriation" can be defined as: "to restore a living culture to its rightful place on Mother Earth," or "to restore a people to a spiritual way of life, in sacred relationship with their ancestral lands, without external interference." As concept, rematriation acknowledges that our ancestors lived in spiritual relationship with our lands for thousands of years, and that we have a sacred duty to maintain that relationship for the benefit of our future generations. From learning and teaching, Emily knows the importance of the relationships we develop within our spirit, community/ecosystems, and natural world. As newly appointed Chairwoman of the Kumeyaay Diegueno Land Conservancy, Ms. Burgueno aims to continue the unification formed around active traditional land stewardship as well as advocacy around protection of sacred sites and cultural/natural resources. One important factor to the work and way of life Ms. Burgueno leads is the importance to implement tribal sovereignty as it is our inherent right to live a life our ancestors intended for us.
